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What is Refugee Week?

Refugee Week is an annual festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees. Refugee Week 2022 takes place 20-26 June, with the theme of 'Healing'.

Every Refugee Week at hundreds of schools across the country, teachers help children and young people to develop an understanding of refugee experiences that they will carry with them into adult life.

There are all kinds of ways schools can get involved, from holding assemblies and dedicated lessons, to creative activities and launching longer-term projects.

This pack has a range of learning activities and resources for children of all ages that can be explored at school, home or in community settings. There is also a range of family-friendly events taking place around the country – see the Refugee Week <u>website</u> to find out what's on near you.

Refugee Week is a partnership project coordinated by <u>Counterpoints Arts.</u> National Education Union and City of Sanctuary (coordinators of Schools of Sanctuary) are among its national partners.

Whether it's reading a book, watching a film or joining a campaign, the small things we do together can be the start of a bigger change.




The Waiting Place

Teaching resources on refugees and migration British Red Cross (KS2, 3 + 4)

Culture Club, Groundwork (KS2, can be adapted for KS1 + EYFS)

A <u>primary education resource</u> by Groundwork exploring the cultural heritage of refugees living in London. Made by teachers for teachers, it links to the national primary school curriculum, enabling pupils ages 4-11 to discover the joys of various cultures through videos, storytelling, crafts and recipes.

The Walk Education & Activity Pack (EYFS, KS1, 2, 3 + 4)

Education and Activity Pack inspired by the journey of Amal, a giant puppet of a nine-year-old Syrian girl who walked from the Syria/Turkey border, to the UK in 2021. The pack is created for all young people with learning material and challenge activities to suit different ages. Activities include writing poems, stories, making artwork and more. The Walk in 2021 was produced by The Walk Productions and Good Chance Theatre in association with Handspring Puppet Company.


Harmonise Online Resource (KS2 + KS3)














Refugee Week was founded in Australia, and the longstanding programme there is run by Australian Refugee Council.
